- ▶ Treat your PowerPoint slides like you would any research paper...
Provide citations and a bibliography for ANY outside sources, including:
 - ▶ Direct quotations
 - ▶ Paraphrased words & ideas
 - ▶ Tables & data
 - ▶ Images
 - ▶ Video & audio files
- ▶ Oral citations should be backed up with written citations in your slides.
